Support facilities and design programs that create a healthy, resilient, and engaged community that is prepared, safe, and housed.

Keeping Livermore Clean

(Goal 13- Focus enforcement [including Neighborhood Preservation] activities on community priorities)

 Continuing to preserve the City's visual appeal, staff addressed graffiti-vandalized newspaper racks on First Street and graffiti on Junction Avenue. Staff temporarily repaired a section of damaged fence along the Arroyo Trail at Isabel Avenue. A permanent repair will follow.









- Neighborhood Preservation staff provided weekend coverage to address illegal signage. This
 weekend, staff responded to 43 open house visits. A majority were in compliance.
 Additionally, staff removed 21 non-compliant garage sale signs.
- Staff from Police, Public Works, and Community Development continue to coordinate
 efforts to address issues related to public safety, trash, and graffiti at the P Street
 undercrossing. Staff from the Police Department, Block by Block, and Neighborhood
 Preservation have made numerous vehicle and foot patrols each day and night this week.
 Staff continues to work on long term solutions to provide more lighting to the underpass
 and will be meeting with the Railroad in July to discuss how this area can be made more
 secure from the train tracks.

Permitting Services

(Goal 6- Provide efficient and effective permit processing services)

Electronic residential permits opened to the public this week. Staff is conducting a soft rollout to further ensure the system can handle the variety of projects this permit type handles.
Residential permits encompass the largest volume of projects amongst all permit types
issued. This permit type includes but is not limited to kitchen and bath remodels, window
and door replacements, additions, new dwellings, stucco/siding, patio covers, sheds, natural
gas generators, foundation repairs and others.



Police Community Partnerships

(Goal 4- Partner with the community to enhance collaborative problem solving and to improve the quality of life in Livermore)

On July 22 and 23, Livermore Police Department Explorers competed in the 12th Annual Central Valley Explorer Competition at Ripon High School. Explorers from more than 30 law enforcement agencies throughout the state (and one in Nevada) took part in the competition. Livermore Police Explorers took 1st Place in Crime Scene Scenario, 3rd Place in the Suspicious Person Scenario and 3rd Place in the Individual Obstacle Course.



Risk Management Program

(Goal 15- Develop, oversee, implement, and manage an effective and efficient risk management program)

• The City's Risk Management Division hosted various training sessions for all City employees during the month of June in observance of National Safety Month, with the goal of focusing on reducing the leading causes of injury at work, on the road, and in homes and communities. Staff learned about ergonomics, office safety, disaster preparedness, health & wellness, and defensive driving to minimize workplace injuries. These trainings reinforce the City of Livermore's commitment to workplace safety.

Climate Action Plan Implementation

(Goal 1- Lead efforts to implement the updated Climate Action Plan in collaboration with internal and external partners)

- Sustainability staff continue to connect with local businesses and organizations to learn about ongoing efforts, discuss challenges, and identify opportunities to collaborate.
- On June 14, staff met with Topcon's Sustainability Director to discuss their corporate sustainability efforts, including a recently completed rooftop solar system that will offset 100% of their electricity use.
- On June 20, staff toured the Livermore Sanitation facility to learn more about their operations.
- On June 24, staff toured Oliveira Enterprises in Byron, CA. Oliveira is a family-owned green waste recycling facility that supplies the City with compost and mulch for SB 1383 compliance.

Blacksmith Square Expansion

The contractor for Blacksmith Square has commenced the early stages of construction.
 Demolition of the existing dumpster corral will be completed this week.

Downtown Utility and Street Work

- Work on Railroad Avenue continues between Livermore Avenue and I Street. The southwest ramp was reconstructed at Livermore/Railroad. Final concrete work was completed on the southern sidewalk. Bricks will be placed in this sidewalk next week and the sidewalk will be opened up by the end of next week. The Railroad/Livermore intersection will be overlayed July 1 and 2. Work will be completed at night starting at 8 p.m. The entire intersection will be closed, and traffic will be detoured. The crosswalk will also be replaced at the Railroad Parking Garage.
- PG&E continued work on a gas main on College Avenue between J Street and G Street.
 PG&E also conducted helicopter inspections of electric towers and power poles around town.

Farmer's Union Restaurant

• Staff are working out final details with Farmers Union to be able to issue the permits in the next couple of weeks.

Flagpole Plaza

 City staff and the consultant met with the neighboring businesses to discuss allowable closures during the project while the new stamped concrete is poured in front of their businesses. 90% plans and specifications are anticipated by the third week of July.

L Street Parking Garage

Work continues on the third level of the garage. Columns and shear walls were poured.

Legacy Livermore

• Legacy continues to work through the updated punch list. The project will be accepted, and bonds will be released once all punch list work is completed.

Livermore Village Remediation

Since the Regional Water Board notified the City on May 17 that they concur with the no
further action request for the SPARC Theater parcel, next steps involve preparing a fact
sheet, sending to all parcels in the vicinity, and providing a 30-day comment period. If no
significant comments are received, the Regional Water Board will issue a no further
remedial action letter and request a well destruction workplan. This is similar to the actions
completed for the Blacksmith Square Expansion parcels.

Airport

(Goal 14- Develop, operate, and maintain the City's infrastructure)

Land Use and Development

• Archer Aviation, an electric vertical takeoff and landing aircraft manufacturer and operator, has <u>publicly announced</u> its intent to establish a network of air taxi routes in the Bay Area, including at the Livermore Airport. While staff has been in discussion with Archer about the company's interest in Livermore, staff have not received any formal development proposals nor made any commitments. As a public airport, Archer is able to conduct some flight operations out of LVK with special approval, but the kind of service Archer is proposing to provide would likely require significant infrastructure development that would need to be developed in collaboration with the City.

Noise Report

The Livermore Airport noise report for the week beginning June 3 is attached.

Unleaded Fuel

This week, Five Rivers Aviation accepted a load of unleaded aviation fuel into their 1,000-gallon tank. The next steps are to pressure test the tank and finalize the inspection with weights and measures. If successfully tested, Five Rivers Aviation will notify Bay Area Air Quality Management District of their intent to operate.

Capital Improvement Plan

(Goal 14- Develop, operate, and maintain the City's infrastructure)

• K Street has been identified as being in poor shape between Elm and Chestnut. The road section needs to be reconstructed rather than just repaved, as there is no drainage and excessive ponding occurs in the middle of the blocks. Engineering is working on preliminary plans for the redesign to incorporate storm water treatment in bioswales and the installation of bulb outs at the intersections. This will be the first area that converts an old wide 'grey street' to a narrower 'green street'. There will public outreach to the community to explain the significant changes. The plan is to create a new project for this stretch of K



- Street with the goal being to reconstruct the road in summer/fall 2025 or summer/fall 2026. In the meantime, staff is working to perform pothole repairs on K Street.
- Webpages for major Capital Improvement Plan projects are maintained on the City website: <u>www.LivermoreCA.gov/CIP</u>. Project information such as schedule, funding, and status is updated monthly. Projects are categorized both by project phase (recently completed, in construction, design, major upcoming) and project type (Airport, Downtown, Parks, etc.).

Community Outreach and Engagement

Library Programming

- On June 19, 34 community members attended Livermore
 Public Library's Summer Science at Del Valle program. During
 the program, an East Bay Regional Park District naturalist
 shared a song to introduce the different names for fish fins
 and discussed the Japanese art of gyotaku, or fish printing.
 Participants had the opportunity to create their own fish
 prints using rubber replicas of the fish found in Lake Del Valle.
- Rincon Branch Library and Fit4Mom hosted their first "Stroller Strides" class of the summer on Friday, June 21. 19 caregivers and 22 stroller-aged children took part in a 60-minute workout. They traversed May Nissen Park, ending their session outside the Library just in time to join the Music & Movement class. Two additional "Stroller Strides" classes will be offered this summer on Friday, July 19 and Friday, August 16. To register, call 925-373-5505.

Recruitment Efforts

The City of Livermore was invited to participate in Lawrence Livermore National
Laboratory's June 13 career fair. City staff from the Human Resources and Planning divisions
represented the City at this well attended event, culminating with 1,087
attendees. Approximately 130 job seekers stopped at the City's booth where staff shared
City employment opportunities and answered questions about developments and projects
in the Livermore community.

Springtown Open Space

(Goal 14- Develop, operate, and maintain the City's infrastructure)

On June 25, staff held a community meeting at the Elks Lodge in Springtown. Approximately 80 people were in attendance while City staff presented updates to the Springtown Open Space Improvements planned for construction in 2025. The presentation was well received by about half of the attendees, while the other half voiced concerns regarding noise, parking and traffic impacts to the area. These concerns are being analyzed in the environmental document, and a draft will be circulated for public review later this summer. 










TOTAL NOISE CONCERNS BY HOUSEHOLD 06/03/2024 – 06/09/2024















TOTAL NIGHT NOISE CONCERNS BY HOUSEHOLD 06/03/2024 - 06/09/2024
